• Separatist leaders of Catalonia recently conducted a referendum.

• The majority voted 'yes' for separation. The supporters of 'no' mostly restrained from voting.

• Following this, Catalonia's separatist leader indicated that he could declare independence.

The central government in Madrid had warned that it would trigger Article
155 of Spain's Constitution unless separatists backed down.

• This measure will allow them to impose direct rule over the wealthy northeastern region.

• If Madrid triggers Article 155, in response, Catalan lawmakers could vote to declare secession unilaterally.

- In such case Madrid might potentially suspend the present Catalan government and take over its police force.
- \bullet Catalans who even oppose independence cherish their autonomy highly. $\ensuremath{^{\text{h}}}$
- So this could spark unrest in a region.
- The Catalonia crisis has prompted a series of huge street rallies and worried investors.

- More than 800 companies have moved their legal headquarters out of Catalonia, citing the risk of instability.
- Madrid has cut its national growth forecast for next year to 2.3%.
- This also adds to the woes of a European Union already grappling with Brexit.
