- To deter illegal border crossings into the US, the government has been separating the children from their parents.

- This has resulted in many of the unaccompanied children to get lost while in federal custody.

### **What decision was taken by the US to deter illegal migrants?**

- The US administration under the President Donald Trump has been concentrating on resolving the illegal border crossing issue.

\n

- They had announced that migrants smuggling their children into the US border would be separated from their children to reduce the illegal crossings.

- Following this decision, the US Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) has reported as many as 1,475 unaccompanied children were missing while in federal custody during 2017.

### **What is the current scenario of migrant children in US?**

- The migrant children who illegally cross borders with their parents are separated from them by the federal authorities and kept in their custody.

\n

- The HHS has reported that since October 2017, more than 700 migrant

children had been taken from adults claiming to be their parents.

- The Federal dept. holds no accountability for these children and this has led to many children missing.

\n

- Thus, over the past week, public debate and outrage have erupted against the administration's insensitive policy towards migrant children.

### **What are the concerns with this decision?**

- While forcibly separating children from the parents, families face a lot of trauma and the health and wellbeing of the children are not considered.

\n

- After separation from parents, the children are not held responsible by the authorities and their needs are not properly being cared.

\n

- While according to the law to reduce illegal crossings, these actions are against the moral practices and not acceptable by the public.
