- A seven-year-old student of Ryan International School, Gurugram, Haryana was found dead in the school campus.

- The Gurugram Police arrested a school bus conductor in connection with the murder.

- However, after the investigation was transferred to the CBI, it came to light that a Class 11 student had committed the murder.

\n

- He had allegedly killed his junior to postpone a parent-teacher meeting and exams.

- The CBI for its part did not find any evidence against the accused bus conductor.

What are the flaws in the investigative mechanism?

- **Procedure** - The turn of events with the incident reveals the sheer insensitivity with which investigating agencies deal with such situations.

\n

- The speed with which the accused was identified, but wrongly, brings out the lack of professional competence and insensitivity.

\n

- A major drawback with the current system is that the investigation authorities first arrest and then investigate.

\n

- Needless to say, innocent victims are caught hold of when the police wanted to shield someone.

\n

- Innocent victims are also sometimes forced to confess, only to show the investigative prowess when the real accused cannot be identified.

- The consequences for the bus conductor and his family if the investigation had not been transferred to the CBI cannot be ignored in this case.

- **Skills** - Our investigation agencies fall short in several ways, and the prime drawback is that they possess scant knowledge of the law.

\n

- Agencies also lack professional skills and are not adept at using technology.

\n

- This makes it easy to arrest, extract a confession, then proceed to create evidence and go to trial.

\n

- **Social** - Factors of caste and creed also find presence in the investigation process.

\n

- There are cases where investigators are hand-picked for particular cases to achieve a particular result favouring a particular group.

- **Political** - The political class is using investigating agencies as tools for partisan political objectives.

\n

- The benefits of extension of service and grant of permanent status are offered to those who oblige with the political class.
