- So, a law against such bribery will become difficult to implement. $\slash n$
- Proof of bribery will also be difficult to find. $\slash n$
- And, even if there is proof, linking it to a candidate will require lengthy investigation. This is difficult in the compressed time-scale of election. \n
- Also, many poor Indians think their vote is a crucial and large part of their

worldly wealth. They treat it with respect and deploy it to their greatest advantage.

- So, to think that most voters can be easily bribed into giving away their only lever of power is disrespectful of Indians' ability to make rational decisions.

- Therefore, elections cannot be canceled merely on the basis of accusations.
