 - The policy was well received in India, with a promise of continued support with other partners.

 - By invoking a larger Indian role in Afghanistan, it might add to the pressures on Pakistan to cooperate with the US.
- \n
 - Pakistan is conscious of the dangers of antagonising the West, which was evident by its marked silence regarding the new policy.
- \n
 - But it also should be noted that Pakistan has got away with its misdeeds for the past 17 years.
- \n
 - So it would indeed prove difficult to turn words into action.
- \n
 - It will not be easy, however, for Pakistan to abandon its investments in cross-border terror and will urge US pressure on India to start talks on Kashmir.

- A positive Indian approach would involve three elements — economic, security and diplomatic.

- India must ramp up its economic diplomacy in Afghanistan to bring immediate benefits to Kabul amidst the deteriorating conditions in the country.

- It must step up security cooperation with Afghanistan, especially in the training of its police and armed forces and intelligence sharing.

- It must also remind the world of its commitment to regional cooperation with Afghanistan and Pakistan, in an atmosphere free of terrorism.
