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Ramakrishna Mission was started in 1871 at Belur, Calcutta by Swami Vivekananda. It was primarily to spread the philosophy of his Guru Ramakrishna Paramhansa and bring about change among Indian youth. The platform served as an amalgamation of western and Indian values - reformist society.

Ramakrishna Mission - British era

- 1) It primarily served as social reform organisation.
- 2) worked relentlessly for awakening the 'purposfulness of youth' and strive to achieve their goal through mental, physical intelligent. Eradicating hunger and poverty.
- 3) It helped to awaken nationality, equality of rights, dignity to fight against caste related oddities.
- 4) The main philosophy 'Service to humankind is service to God' was followed in safeguarding women and poor rights.
- 5) Swami Vivekananda was able to propagate his principles of vedan that would be pillar stone of building strong, vibrant India.
- 6) Propagation of harmony of religion to build secularism in India when communalism was let out through British carrots & stick policy.

Ramakrishna Mission - Continuing service

Offlate the Ramakrishna mission has moved from the principles of social service, common religion to civic responsibility, environmental responsibilities

- 1) With regards to fulfill environmental obligation, it had recently announced ban on firecrackers during diwali celebration.

 - 5) Even today, it continues to establish schools across India, world to : train youth according to Vedanta philosophy.
