While anonymity is part of being a civil servant, Social media, in recent times, has been a platform to come out of this cocoon for Social good.

POSITIVES :

- \* Social media provides an opportunity for bureaucrats to shape the public discourse and engage with the public while being politically neutral. Eg: Brexit Debates in UK.
- \* Many civil servants have become accessible to the common people & public service delivery issues have been resolved through the use of social media.

↳ For example, during Covid-19, social media proved effective in mobilising essential items to help the needy.

- \* Social media has also created a positive outlook towards an institution long perceived as opaque & inaccessible.

Social media has also increased awareness among people about government policies & programs.

### Issues :

- \* Often used for Self-Promotion:

Social media is getting used by civil servants for self-promotion & justifies that in the name of accessibility & accountability.

- \* When any views of the civil servant is posted, in the eye of the common man, it may not be seen as the view of an individual but more, <sup>as</sup> the view of the office that he/she holds, which would appear as if the bureaucrat is not being neutral.

For Example: An officer Ajay Gangwar 'liked' a facebook post critical on the Prime Minister - was seen as a bureaucrat expressing his views rather than an individual's perspective.

### WAY FORWARD :

- \* Bureaucrats should use social media to improve & shape public policies.
- \* If not used properly, social media might threaten their role as independent advisers.
- \* After all Bureaucracy is all about evolving brilliantly as a part of this institution & system rather than shining individually.
